

On 1951, the first case of a patient with a large, asymptomatic, well-circumscribed, lobulated, and encapsulated mass in the right breast was reported. The patient was a 45-year-old woman who presented with a palpable mass in the right breast. The mass was found during a routine physical examination. The patient had no family history of breast cancer and no other symptoms. The mass was removed by a lumpectomy. The pathology report showed a well-circumscribed, lobulated, and encapsulated mass composed of glandular and stromal tissue. The mass was negative for malignancy. The patient was followed up for 30 months and remained free of recurrence. This case is the first reported case of a large, asymptomatic, well-circumscribed, lobulated, and encapsulated mass in the right breast. The mass was found during a routine physical examination.
